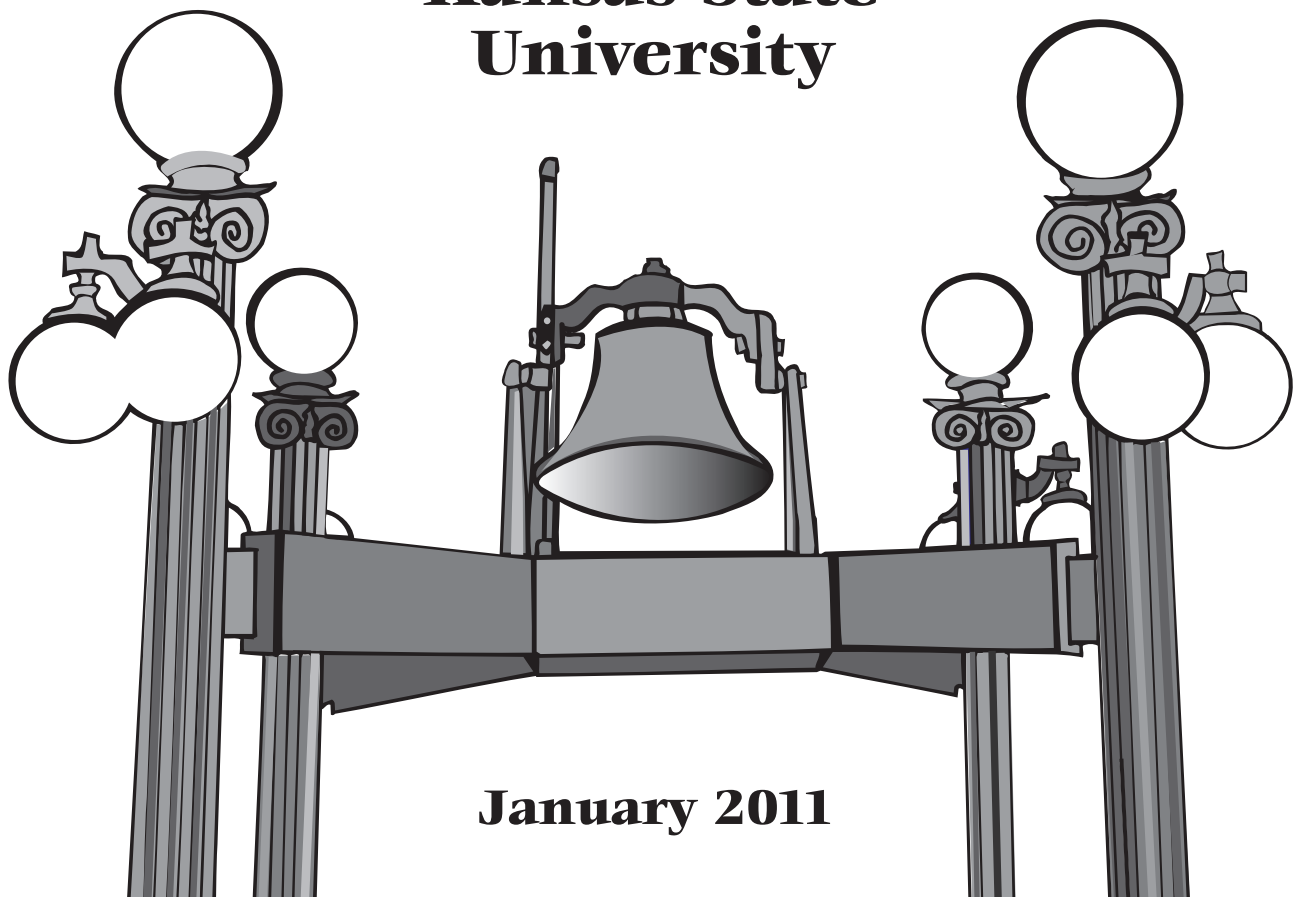

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Admission to graduate study is granted by the Dean of the Graduate School upon the recommendation of the faculty in the graduate program. Applicants seeking admission to the master's degree program in college student development must submit the information noted below. *All materials must be received before review will begin.*

- A. A Completed Graduate School Application.** The application may be completed online by going to www.k-state.edu/grad/gsprospective/apply/index.htm. It is highly recommended that the application for admission be completed online and submitted electronically.

Application Deadlines. The College of Education accepts applications throughout the year. However, the deadlines noted below have been established for admission to start in a particular semester. Failure to meet the deadline for a particular semester could delay admission into the program. *The Graduate School application and all additional documentation must be received by the following deadline dates for admission in a particular semester.*

B. Graduate School Application Fee.

Domestic Students—A \$40 application fee is required for all domestic students; *your application will not be processed without this fee.* When applying online, you may pay by credit card. If mailing a paper copy of the completed application, please make a check payable to the KSU Graduate School and include it with your application.

International Students—A \$55 application fee is required; *your application will not be processed without this fee.* When applying online, you may pay by credit card. If mailing a paper copy of the completed application, please pay with an international cashier's check or money order (in U.S. funds) payable to the KSU Graduate School and include it with your application. Cash or personal checks cannot be accepted from international students.

- C. OFFICIAL transcripts.** Send TWO official transcripts from the institution awarding the bachelor's degree and TWO official transcripts from all the institutions attended since completion of the bachelor's degree. If you have credits from K-State, we will obtain a copy of your K-State transcript at no cost to you. *Copies of transcripts that are stamped "issued to student" will not be accepted.*

For consideration for regular admission, applicants must have a 3.0 grade point average (GPA) in their junior and senior years of the bachelor's program. Those with GPA's between 2.65 and 2.99 may be considered for probationary admission if it can be demonstrated that there is potential for success in the graduate program. This potential is demonstrated, in part, on the basis of results from the Graduate Record Exam (GRE) or the Miller Analogies Test (MAT).

- D. Statement of Goals and Professional Experience.** Submit a 1-2 page statement that includes the following information:

- Career and professional goals and aspirations, and how being accepted to the program will benefit the goals and aspirations;
- The reason for interest in seeking the master's degree in College Student Development;
- Evidence of motivation, leadership, and strong work ethic; and
- Professional experiences that support application

The paper is to be well written, thoughtfully presented, and organized. For resources to help with writing the paper, see the Purdue Online Writing Lab (OWL) at <http://owl.english.purdue.edu/>.

- F. TOEFL.** Applicants whose native language is not English must submit a current TOEFL score (Test of English as a Foreign Language). The TOEFL is offered several times a

year throughout the world by the Educational Testing Service (www.ets.org/toefl). The TOEFL school code for Kansas State University is 6334. International applicants are advised to take the TOEFL as early as possible to avoid delays in the processing of their applications for admission. An applicant who has received a degree in the last two years from a United States college or university is exempt from this requirement.

There are three types of TOEFL scores: paper-based TOEFL, computer-based TOEFL, and TOEFL IBT (internet-based TOEFL taken in real time). TOEFL scores are valid for two years from the initial test date. A score of at least 550 (paper-based test), 213 (computer-based test), or 79 (IBT - internet-based test) on the TOEFL is required to be considered for admission to the Graduate School. Applicants with scores of 600 (paper-based), 50 (computer-based) or 100 (IBT - internet based) or above may be considered for regular admission. Applicants with scores between 550/213/79 and 599/249/99 may be admitted provisionally and must at the time of their enrollment demonstrate proficiency in reading and writing English and in understanding spoken American English to the satisfaction of the Graduate School. Those who do not meet the minimum proficiency standard will be required to complete specified courses offered by the English Language Program (ELP) at Kansas State. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Non-Degree Status. In some cases, a student may wish to take a course(s) prior to being admitted in a degree program. In these cases, a person must be admitted on a non-degree status. Students may take *up to nine graduate credit hours* as a non-degree student in the Graduate School prior to being admitted into a graduate degree program. However, *successful completion of any hours taken as a non-degree seeking student does not guarantee admission into the program.*

Graduate Handbook. Once admitted, students should become familiar with the Graduate Handbook at www.ksu.edu/grad/gscurrent/handbook/index.htm. This handbook includes

policies and procedures about advising, the program of study, enrollment, transfer credits, the final oral/written exam, required approval forms, and other aspects of the graduate program.

Virtual Orientation for New Graduate Students. The Graduate School encourages all new graduate students to complete a virtual orientation prior to coming to campus, if possible. The website for this orientation is www.ksu.edu/grad/gsprospective/orientation/about.htm. There is valuable information concerning housing options, orientation dates, registration and enrollment procedures, and many other aspects of the campus. By completing this virtual orientation, you should become familiar with what to expect when you arrive on campus.

Advisor and Program of Study. Once admitted to the program, an advisor is assigned. The advisor assists the student in developing the program of courses the student will take to earn the master's degree. A program of study listing the courses the student intends to take is submitted to the Graduate School upon completion of nine hours (part-time students) or during the second semester (full-time students).

Graduate Assistantships. A limited number of graduate assistantships are available in the College of Education. Go to www.coe.ksu.edu/grad/assistantships.htm for detailed information and the assistantship application form. Assistantships are commonly available for the academic year (fall and spring semesters). Completed graduate assistant applications must be submitted by April 1 to each department for which the applicant would like to be considered. It is helpful to talk with the appropriate department chair as early as possible to learn of assistantships available in the department.

Program Requirements for the Master of Science in College Student Development

39 credit hours

This graduate program meets program curricular requirements established by the College Student Education International (ACPA) and the Council for the Advancement of Standards (CAS) guidelines for professional preparation programs.

This graduate program prepares professionals for careers in various student affairs offices within a college or university. Students complete 24 hours of core courses and 15 hours in one of three specialty options:

- The **advising option** is appropriate for persons who intend to provide developmental advising within college or university settings.
- The **administration option** is appropriate for persons who intend to work in student affairs in higher education or manage student services.
- The **student services in intercollegiate athletics** option prepares students to work with college student athletes.

A program of study is jointly developed by the student and advisor with the approval of two other graduate faculty members who comprise the student's supervisory committee.
